# Purpose of the policy

This policy details how Wyre Forest school deals with an emergency evacuation of the exam room(s) by defining staff roles and responsibilities and confirming the emergency evacuation procedure.

# When is an emergency evacuation required?

An emergency evacuation is required where it is unsafe for candidates to remain in the exam room. This might include a fire in the exam room, the fire alarm sounding to warn of fire, bomb alert or other serious threat.

In exceptional situations, where candidates might be severely disadvantaged or distressed by remaining in the exam room, the emergency evacuation procedure may also need to be followed. This might include situations where there is severe disruption in the exam room, serious illness of a candidate or invigilator or similarly serious incidents.

As each incident may be different, advice will be sought from the relevant awarding body as soon as it is safe to do so, particularly where the centre is concerned about the security of the examination(s). (ICE 25.4)

Where candidates are unable to return to the building to complete the examination, the relevant awarding body will be contacted immediately for advice. The awarding bodies have procedures in place to ensure that candidates are not disadvantaged where they are unable to complete the examination due to circumstances beyond their control. (ICE 24.5)

# **Emergency evacuation of an exam room**

#### Roles and responsibilities

#### **Head of centre**

- Ensures the emergency evacuation policy for exams is fit for purpose and complies with relevant health and safety regulation
- Ensures any instructions from relevant local or national agencies are referenced and followed where applicable, including information from the National Counter Terrorism Security Office on the Procedures for handling bomb threats <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/bomb-threats-guidance/procedures-for-handling-bomb-threats">https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/bomb-threats-guidance/procedures-for-handling-bomb-threats</a>
- Where safe to do so, ensures candidates are given the opportunity to sit exams for their published duration

#### Senior leader

 Where responsible for the centre-wide emergency evacuation procedure, ensures all staff and appointed fire marshals are aware of the policy and procedures to be followed when an emergency evacuation of an exam room is required

# Additional learning support (ALS) lead/Special educational needs coordinator

- Ensures appropriate arrangements are in place for the emergency evacuation of a disabled candidate from an exam room where different procedures or assistance may need to be provided for the candidate
- Ensures the candidate is informed prior to taking their exams of what will happen in the event of an emergency evacuation

#### **Exams officer**

- Ensures invigilators are trained in emergency evacuation procedures and how an incident and actions taken must be recorded
- Ensures candidates are briefed prior to exams taking place, on what will happen in the event of an emergency in the exam room
- Provides invigilators with a copy of the emergency evacuation procedure for every exam room
- Provides a standard invigilator announcement for each exam room which includes appropriate instructions for candidates about emergency procedures and what will happen if the fire alarm sounds
- Provides an exam room incident log in each exam room
- Liaises with the ALS lead and other relevant staff prior to each exam where different procedures or assistance may need to be provided for a disabled candidate
- Briefs invigilators prior to each exam where different procedures or assistance may need to be provided for a disabled candidate
- Ensures appropriate follow-up is undertaken after an emergency evacuation reporting the
  incident to the awarding body and the actions taken through the special consideration
  process where applicable (in cases where a group of candidates have been disadvantaged
  by a particular event)

#### **Invigilators**

- By attending training and/or update sessions, ensure they understand what to do in the event
  of an emergency in the exam room
- Follow the actions required in the emergency evacuation procedure issued to them for every exam room
- Confirm with the exams officer, where different procedures or assistance may need to be provided for a disabled candidate they are invigilating
- Record details on the exam room incident log to support follow-up reporting to the awarding body by the exams officer (see below)

#### Other relevant centre staff

 Support the senior leader, ALS lead, exams officer and invigilators in ensuring the safe emergency evacuation of exam rooms

# **Recording details**

As soon as practically possible and safe to do so, details should be recorded. Details must include:

the actual time of the start of the interruption

- the actions taken
- the actual time the exam(s) resumed
- the actual finishing time(s) of the resumed exam(s)

# Further details could include:

- report on candidate behaviour throughout the interruption/evacuation
- a judgement on the impact on candidates after the interruption/evacuation

## **Emergency evacuation procedure**

Invigilators are trained in this procedure and understand the actions they must take in the event of a fire alarm or other emergency that leads to an evacuation of the exam room.

## Emergency evacuation procedure

Actions to be taken (as detailed in current JCQ <u>Instructions for conducting examinations</u> section 25, **Emergencies**)

Stop the candidates from writing

Collect the attendance register (in order to ensure all candidates are present)

Evacuate the examination room in line with the instructions given by the appropriate authority

Advise candidates to leave all question papers and scripts in the examination room

Candidates must be advised to close their answer booklet

Ensure candidates leave the room in silence

Ensure the candidates are supervised as closely as possible while they are out of the examination room to make sure there is no discussion about the examination

Make a note of the time of the interruption and how long it lasted

Allow the candidates the remainder of the working time set for the examination once it resumes

If there are only a few candidates, consider the possibility of taking the candidates (with question papers and scripts) to another place to finish the examination

Make a full report of the incident and of the action taken, and send to the relevant awarding body

## Additional centre-specific actions to be taken

This plan is in addition to the Whole School Emergency Evacuation Plan

All staff and pupils involved in the exam will be made aware of the Fire/Emergency Evacuation Plan and exit routes prior to commencing the exam.

Should a fire break out in the school, it will be the responsibility of staff members to:

- Raise the alarm using the nearest break glass.
- Evacuate the school.
- Ensure all pupils are out of the building.
- On hearing the fire alarm, the person managing the exam group will take the pupils to the nearest fire exit.
- Pupils MUST evacuate the building in silence.

**NO ONE** should stop to collect personal belongings including exams paper.

- Pupils must be evacuated to the nearest, separate assembly point, which for the exam groups is on the pavement at the front of the building by the office.
- Staff will check pupils against the fire register and immediately inform administration staff of any missing pupils.
- All areas have direct escape routes to assembly points on either the rear play ground or the front of the school.
- Fire exit signs are posted on all exits.
- All exits are kept unlocked and clear of obstructions.
- There is emergency lighting on all key routes throughout the building. These are tested threemonthly and fully services annually.
- All pupils sitting an exam will be kept separated from from peers and supervised at all times to avoid any communication.

NO ONE may re-enter the building until they have been give the all clear by the Headteacher.
