

# Covid-19 update...

At the moment we have 4 members of staff who have tested positive for COVID-19, this is out of 190 staff and 300 children. I know you will wish them a speedy recovery and we apologise for the knock-on effect this has on people's lives. We have many staff who have children in other schools who are having to look after their own children because they are now self-isolating. I know it's incredibly difficult but we have to follow the strict guidelines that we are working to. We're also only human and will make mistakes along the way - for that I apologise but everything is done to protect pupils and staff. For those parents that do not believe in COVID-19 or the severity of the virus I make no apologies about the way we are doing things.

Where classes are self-isolating or not at school because staff are self-isolating, class teams will be providing work (remote learning). During lockdown 1 we had some lovely photos of some of the work and activities you did at home - we'd love to see what you're up to now.

To try and limit contact even between bubbles, we are now ensuring that every class eats their lunch within their classroom so there will be nobody using the dining room.

Please make sure you are checking texts and emails from school daily as things are happening very quickly at the moment, especially if we have a positive case of COVID-19 (results that may affect the day to day running of the school can come through very late).

## A parent's guide to Instagram

Instagram is one of the most popular social media apps amongst both children and adults. There are over 1 billion active users of which 500 million use it every day so there is a good chance you or our pupils have already come across it.

Instagram is a free photo and video sharing app which enables users to upload their own or to look at other peoples from around the world. Users can "follow" anyone they like to see their posts and anyone can see what the user uploads. This can be solved by setting the profile to private in the same way other apps like Facebook and tiktok are done.

Also, Instagram has a new feature which is called "reels" which is very similar to TikTok (look out in our future newsletters for a guide to TikTok). It is also used by celebrities and influencers to project a glamourous image of their world so it is easy for young children to believe what they see.

Children should be 13 years old to create an account and Instagram have a set of guidelines which forbid images such as nudity, crime, hate, terrorism etc but obviously things can slip through the net like with all social media apps.


The courses are available to anyone over the age of 19 and who has lived within the EU for the past 3 years.
