#### **Information for Parents**



I can't believe we are nearly in May and hurtling towards the end of another academic year!

You may have noticed that the playgrounds are starting to break up a little and the surfaces are not looking very good, also we have to wade across the one playground when it floods despite lots of people claiming they have fixed the problem. During the summer holiday we are hoping to have some major works done on both playgrounds that pupil's access from the downstairs rooms and dig up and put in proper drainage. Not

only will it make a safe surface but will hopefully provide free flow for classes. Fingers crossed we can get the project sorted.

Sometimes we have to keep the transport gates closed if there is an incident with a child, this is because the safety of the children is our number one priority, but it can cause other buses and taxis to queue down the drive. If you park next to the pavement you need to be prepared to get blocked in. We unfortunately have had some parents getting abusive to transport drivers and making them move - buses and taxis then go over the pedestrian crossing making it unsafe for walkers, the parents then zoom off at speed. Please remember this is a staff car park - Matt on the front gate does an awesome job at trying to find parking spaces for parents. Please be kind and tolerant.

You may have heard in the press that many schools are looking at banning mobile phones. Our policy is;

Following guidance from the DfE 'Mobile Phones in Schools' February 2024, mobile phone usage by pupils is prohibited at Wyre Forest School, this includes the use of smart watches. The exceptions to this rule are:

- 1. Pupils who travel independently to school and require a mobile phone to keep them safe whilst in the community.
- 2. Pupils who use mobile devices whilst on school transport to support self-regulation.
- 3. Sixth form pupils who are preparing for adulthood and life after school.

In these cases, devices must be handed to staff on arrival to school. Class teacher will keep them locked away securely until the end of the school day.

In sixth form pathway, pupil's phones will be kept securely in their lockers. At times, sixth form pupils may be allowed to use their phones under the direction and supervision of staff. Phones must be placed face up on the desk in clear view of staff. Phone cameras and social media must not be used.

These pupils must adhere to the school's acceptable use agreement for mobile phone use.

Phones must not be taken on off-site visits.

The school accepts no responsibility for mobile phones that are lost, damaged or stolen on school premises or transport or while pupils are travelling to and from school.

We spend a long-time teaching pupils how to try and stay safe with mobile phones - they are a fixture of life, so education is the key to keeping our young people safe. If you need any help with putting privacy settings etc on, then contact school and we will try to help.

In addition to this as part of our continuing safeguarding measures parents will not be able to use their phones when they enter the gates to the transport compound or playgrounds. We will be displaying signs. Staff are only allowed to use work phones that we are able to monitor. Thank you for your support with this to keep all our children as safe as possible on school grounds.



## Advice to Promote Early Language Development

#### Using visuals to support understanding

Some visuals are easier to understand than others such as objects.

Objects are used by all of us. Some people use them without knowing that they are using objects to communicate. Every time you give someone their coat, or pick up the car keys for example, you communicate something to them.

However, objects can be used in a more structured way to communicate too. We call refer to this as objects of reference. Objects of reference can help a child understand what is happening next.

You can also use photographs as well, as they look like the real thing. We refer to this as photographs of reference.

How to use objects and photographs of reference

- Introduce objects and/or photographs to help prepare your child for activities that will be happening next.
   For example, when it is time for a dinner you might show them a plate and/or photograph of dinner. Let them touch or hold the object or photograph
- When going swimming you might show they arm bands and/or a photograph of the swimming centre
- Be consistent in showing the same object/picture to match that event.
